MILITARY EQUIPMENT INVENTORY

1. Specialized Firearms, Ammunition and Equipment (Equipment Category 10)

a. Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

Rifles: Weapons that are fired from shoulder level, thereby having greater accuracy over longer distance.

DPMS Panther 5.56mm, Patrol use, Quantity: 9, Cost: \$769.99

Springfield Saint, 5.56mm Patrol use, Quantity: 12, Cost: \$789.99

Ammunition: Various Brands, 223 Remington/ 5.56mm, jacketed hollow point (JHP) 55-60 grain cartridge is the primary duty ammunition for the department deployed during lethal encounters. Various Brands, 223 Remington/ 5.56mm, Full metal Jacket (FMJ) 55-60 grain is the primary training ammunition used during training and qualifications for the department.

Various Brands, 223 Remington/ 5.56mm JHP ammunition, Cost: \$1374.00 per 1000 round case.

Various Brands, 223 Remington/ 5.56mm FMJ ammunition, Cost: \$420.00 per 1000 round case.

Surefire Rifle Suppressor: Cost: \$2500.00, Weapon suppressor reduce muzzle report from firearms. This prevents damage to officers hearing while discharging rifles in enclosed buildings.

b. Purpose

To be used as precision weapons to address threats with greater precision and/or distance where distances/precision are greater than the capabilities of a handgun, if present and feasible.

c. Authorized Use

Only members that have successfully completed a department approved rifle training course and qualification are authorized to carry and deploy a rifle.

d. Life Span

Rifle – 15 years

Ammunition – Until expended

e. Fiscal Impact

Rifle annual maintenance – Approximately \$50.00 per rifle

Various Brands, .223 Remington/ 5.56mm JHP ammunition – Annual cost \$0 - \$1374.00

Various Brands, .223 Remington/ 5.56mm FMJ ammunition – Annual cost \$0 - \$840.00

Suppressor annual maintenance - \$0.00

f. Training

Prior to carrying a rifle, officers must be certified by POST instructors in the operation of the rifle. Additionally, all members that operate any rifle are required to pass a range qualification two times a year.

g. Legal and Procedural Rules

Use is established under Policy 306.6 of the McFarland Police Department Policy Manual. It is the policy of the McFarland Police Department to utilize rifles only for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal law, and within department policy.

2. Noise Flash Diversionary Devices (Equipment Category 12)

a. Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

Distraction Devices: A distraction device is ideal for distracting dangerous suspects during assaults, hostage rescue, room entry or other high-risk arrest situations.

Combined Tactical System. 7290 Low Roll Distraction Device, Cost: \$52.90 per unit. A nonbursting, non-fragmenting, limited rolling device that produces a thunderous bang and intense bright light. Ideal for distracting dangerous suspects during assaults, hostage rescue, room entry or other high-risk arrest situations.

b. Purpose

To produce atmospheric over-pressure and brilliant white light and, as a result, can cause short-term (6-8 seconds) physiological/psychological sensory deprivation to give officers a tactical advantage.

c. Authorized Use

Diversionary Devices shall be used:

1. By officers who have been trained in their proper use.
2. In hostage and barricaded subject situations.
3. In high-risk warrant (search/arrest) services where there may be extreme hazards to officers or there is no response from suspects to officers' announcements.
4. During other high-risk situations where their use would enhance officer safety.
5. During training exercises.

d. Lifespan

Until used.

e. Fiscal Impact

No fixed annual cost. Approximately 0-7 replacements annually \$0- \$369.60.

f. Training

Prior to use, Officers must attend diversionary device training that is conducted by POST certified Instructors.

g. Legal and Procedural Rules

It is the policy of the Department to utilize diversionary devices only for official law enforcement purposes, pursuant to State and Federal law, and within department policy.

3. CS/OC Gas (Equipment Category 12)

a. Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

Chemical Agent and Smoke Canisters: Canisters that contain chemical agents that are released when deployed.

1. Description, Quantity, capabilities, and purchase costs Various Quantities of Chemical Agent Munitions, which are commonly referred to as "Tear Gas" are used by the department as a non-lethal tool to disperse rioting suspects and on barricaded suspects per department policy and applicable law. The department uses chemical agents which are used by law enforcements across the United States: CS (2 Chlorobenzylidenemalononitrile) and OC (Oleoresin Capsicum). CS has been medically tested in the UK and US, specifically by the U.S. Army. There are no known allergic reactions to CS. OC was de-regulated in California in 1996, is endorsed by the FBI, and is available to civilians to legal possess (2.5 oz. or less.) OC is an inflammatory agent which causes involuntary closure of eyes (open in 2-5 minutes) and respiratory inflammation (subsides in approximately 2 minutes).

b. Purpose

To limit the escalation of conflict where employment of lethal force is prohibited or not feasible. Situations for use of the less lethal weapon system may include but are not limited to:

1. Self-destructive, dangerous and or combative individuals.
2. Riot/crowd control and civil unrest incidents.
3. Circumstances where a tactical advantage can be obtained.
4. Potentially vicious animals.
5. Training exercises or approved demonstrations.

c. Authorized Use

Only officers who have received POST certification in the use of chemical agents are authorized to use chemical agents.

d. Training

Sworn officers utilizing chemical agent canisters/ munitions are certified by POST less lethal and chemical agent instructors.

e. Lifespan

5 years from manufacture date.

f. Fiscal Impact

Munitions range from \$17.55 - \$57.30 per unit. Annual fiscal impact of \$0.00-\$400.00 per year depending on use.

g. Legal and Procedural Rules

It is the policy of the department to utilize chemical agents for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal Law, and within department policy.

4. Projectile Launch Platforms and Associated Munitions (Equipment Category 14)

a. Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

40/37 mm Launchers and Rounds: 40mm/37mm Launchers are utilized by department personnel as a less lethal tool to launch less lethal munitions.

Lewis Machine & Tool CO., 40mm Multi-Shot Launcher, cost: \$2487.45, quantity: 2

Defense Technology, 40/37 mm Single Shot Launcher, cost: \$1035.00, \$928.75, quantity: 4

Defense Technology, 40/37 mm Exact Impact Sponge, #6325, #6299 cost: \$30.10 per round. A less lethal 40/37 mm lightweight plastic and foam projectile fired from a single 40/37 mm launcher with a rifled barrel. The 40/37 mm Exact impact Sponge Round provides accurate and effective performance when fired from approved distances.

b. Purpose

To limit the escalation of conflict where employment of lethal force is prohibited or not feasible.

c. Authorized Use

Situations for use of the less lethal weapon system may include, but are not limited to:

1. Self-destructive, dangerous and/or combative individuals.
2. Riot/crowd control and civil unrest incidents.
3. Circumstances where a tactical advantage can be obtained.
4. Potentially vicious animals
5. Training exercises or approved demonstrations.

d. Training

Sworn officers utilizing 40/37 mm less lethal chemical agents or impact rounds are trained in the use by POST certified less lethal instructors.

e. Lifespan

20-25 years

f. Fiscal Impact

Annual resupply of \$0.00 to \$295.00.

g. Legal and Procedural Rules

It is the policy of the McFarland Police Department to utilize the 37/40mm for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal law, and within department policy.

5. Less lethal Shotguns/Bean bag Rounds (Equipment Category 14)

a. Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

Less lethal Shotgun: Less Lethal Shotgun is used to deploy the less lethal Safariland 12 ga. Drag #3027 Stabilized Beanbag Round.

Remington Less Lethal Shotgun, cost, \$325.00, quantity: 9. The Remington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun is used to deploy the less lethal Safariland 12 ga. Drag #3027 Stabilized Beanbag Round. The Safariland Beanbag Round can be deployed up to a distance of 75

feet. The range of the weapon system helps maintain space between officers and a suspect reducing the immediacy of a threat which is a principle of de-escalation.

12 ga. Safariland Beanbag Round, cost: \$5.00 per round. A less lethal 2.4 inch 12 ga. Shotgun round firing a ballistics fiber bag filled with 40 grams of lead shot at a velocity of 270-290 feet per second (FPS). Safariland Beanbag rounds are discharged from a dedicated 12 ga. Shotgun that is distinguishable by an orange buttstock and fore grip. This round provides accurate and effective performance when fired from the approved distance of not fewer than five (5) feet. Effectiveness depends on many variables, such as, clothing, stature, and the area of impact.

b. Purpose

To limit the escalation of conflict where employment of lethal force is prohibited or not feasible.

c. Authorized Use

1. Self-destructive, dangerous and/or combative individuals.
2. Riot/crowd control and civil unrest incidents.
3. Circumstances where a tactical advantage can be obtained.
4. Potentially vicious animals
5. Training exercises or approved demonstrations.

c. Lifespan

No expiration date.

d. Fiscal Impact

Safariland Beanbag Round – annual cost \$200.00

e. Training

All officers are trained in the 12 ga. Less lethal shotgun via in-service training.

f. Legal and Procedural Rules

It is the policy of this department to utilize the less lethal shotgun and munitions for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal law, and within department policy.

6. Armored Vehicles

a. Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

One (1) - Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicle for use during critical incidents to support tactical operations and provide safe transport, security, and rescue of department personnel and members of the public. This MRAP can also be used during weather-related emergencies, search and rescue operations, and to assist allied agencies in similar circumstances. This MRAP was free for use by McFarland PD through the LESO program and any costs associated with this MRAP will be for diesel fuel and minor repairs needed to maintain the MRAP in optimal operating status.
